The role of parents/carers is crucial in helping schools develop and maintain good behaviour. To support the school, parents/carers should get to know the school's behaviour policy, reinforce it at home, and, where possible, take part in the life of the school and its culture.

Parents/carers are responsible for online behaviour incidents amongst young people that occur outside the school day and off the school premises. However, schools should have the confidence to sanction pupils when their behaviour online poses a threat or causes harm to other pupils.

Today George and Theo spent the day tied together. This was part of their fundraising for Great Ormond Street Hospital, which specialises in separating conjoined twins. The boys have raised over £250, which is an impressive amount. Well done George and Theo, we are all very proud of you.

OUR LEARNING THIS WEEK

YEAR 3

The Year 3 children have settled beautifully after the Winter holidays and have returned to school ready to learn and working their hardest. In Maths we continue to learn about multiplication and division. We have been spotting the links between the calculations and using these to help us

solve them. For example, if we know that 4 x 8 =32, we also know that 8 x 4 = 32, 32 divided by 4 = 8 and 32 divided by 8 =4. We have learned to multiply numbers by 10 and used this to multiply two-digit numbers. Next, we will focus on multiplying a two-digit number by a one-digit number with an exchange.

In English we are finishing writing our guided poems. We have come up with wonderful sound, smell and sound metaphors and similes to describe colours. Next week, the children will be writing their own poems with metaphors and similes to create colour imagery.

In History we have placed ancient Egypt in time and place and have carefully considered the important role of the River Nile in the people of ancient Egypt's lives.

In Science we are learning about forces and have thought about pushes, pulls, friction and gravity. We know that a force is a push or a pull on an object.



YEAR 4

YR4 have been recapping 11 and 12 multiplication facts and then moving on to finding factor pairs. They have also been working together to multiply 2 digit numbers by 10 (understanding that zero is a placeholder) in fun ways.

This week in English they have started to share write a river poem. There have been some amazing and imaginative vocabulary choices used! They have been focusing on metaphors and personification when writing.

In Science they have begun their new topic, States of Matter. YR 4 classified solids and liquids and discussed different gases. Their big question this term is 'How does the water go round and round?'

Geography links closely to Science and this week they have learnt the process of the water cycle, drawing and labelling it.

All in all a busy week - thank you for your great efforts this week YR4! Have a lovely weekend.




<u>YEAR 5</u>

A busy start to the Spring term in year 5. In our English we began by reading the start of Cosmic by Frank Cottrell Boyce and learning all about cars and car showrooms in order to write stories. We have now begun writing sentences that we can use in our stories. In maths, we have begun learning how to multiply 4 digit numbers by a 1-digit number using short multiplication, and have also looked at multiplying 2 digits by 2 digits.


Everyone was very excited to learn about the Tudors, especially when we heard all about Henry VIII and his six wives and how many heads he chopped off.

The highlight of our week was stargazing on the playground on Tuesday. We had a great time and were able to spot lots of stars and also could see Jupiter very clearly. It was lovely to welcome so many parents at this and see the enthusiasm the children showed.



<u>YEAR 6</u>

What a week! It has been lovely having all the children back and getting into the swing of things. Year 6 have been creating some wonderful sentences in English based on the dystopian adventure story 'Tyger' by SF Said. In maths, we learnt about converting metric units and imperial units of measurement and we completed our hot task on this in preparation for starting our decimals unit next week. On Tuesday afternoon, Year 6 continued to create beautiful Samba music, continued expanding their French vocabulary, and began their dance lessons in PE. On Wednesday, we had an afternoon of Computing and RE. In Computing, we learnt about barcodes and QR codes and did a QR code treasure hunt across the school. In RE, we thought about whether anything is ever eternal, and we analysed the Christian perspective on this. Thursday afternoon was all about Geography! Year 6 began to build on their knowledge of the Amazon Rainforest by learning about the countries in South America. Finally, to end the week, Year 6 played some Tag Rugby.

This week, we welcomed three new members into Blake Class. They have settled brilliantly and it has been lovely seeing the other children show them around the school.

We have started our new English unit, reading 'Leon and the Place Between' and have been responding to the wonderful illustrations before reading the book. Children have shared lots of ideas of what the story could be about, proving that a picture really does paint a thousand words. In maths, we have been reminding ourselves of important maths vocabulary and we each made a word back to refer back to in future.

In art, children looked at the work of René Magritte and produced work in his style. We have been really impressed with the standard of work produced this week and look forward to the term ahead.
