OUR YEAR IN REFLECTION

YEAR 3

We are so proud of how Year 3 have grown and developed over the last year. They have truly been so wonderful, resilient, kind and hardworking.

Despite all of the changes and transitions, which they handled incredibly maturely, we have filled the year with so much exciting learning. We have been transported to the Stone Ages, Ancient Egypt, Anglo-Saxon and Viking periods in History; we ventured around our local area and learnt lots of interesting facts about Norwich, and then compared our climate to other parts of the world in Geography. We have been creative and expressive in Art, as well as understanding our rights and responsibilities in RSHE and how we contribute to our communities. We had our Maths thinking caps on all year, exploring place value, the four operations, learning about time and money and rehearsing our 3, 4, 6 and 9 times tables. We have taken Maths outside and used our playground and school garden to help us with our learning, visualising concepts in different and abstract ways to support with consolidation. In English we have produced some beautiful pieces of creative writing and have made it our mission to 'deepen the moment' whilst doing so, taking inspiration from fiction texts such as 'The Incredible Book Eating Boy', 'Little Red Reading Hood', 'The Wolves in the Walls' to name a few, as well as our non-fiction texts where we have used technology and books to discover relevant and topical information. In Science we have experimented, hypothesised, questioned and became fascinated by fossils, plants, the human body, laws of motion and light and shadow, as well as having visitors in to help us with our learning. We had visits from animal experts, a Biologist and a Chemist, and learnt about the work of Mary Anning, Beatrix Potter and Sir Isaac Newton.

We have been on some fabulous trips to the Time and Tide Museum, West Stowe, The Millenium Library, The Bridewell Museum and Hickling Broad and have definitely made the most of hosting experience days in our lovely school grounds.

Mrs Lincoln and Miss Potter have absolutely adored teaching the children from 3 Blyton and 3 Potter, and both feel very lucky to have shared this year with them all. We know they will continue to be phenomenal students and flourish in Year 4.

YEAR 4

What a fantastic Year 4 we have had, with the children working hard and making progress in all areas of their learning. Particular highlights were our trips and visitors, including facing our fears with a high climb and katakanuing down the river at Hautbois Activity Centre - and some children getting entwined in the bushes!

Roman Day was a brilliant experience with many children dressed for the occasion as soldiers, emperors, citizens and slaves. We were fortunate enough to meet a Roman settler who help us make coins, work collaboratively to dress up in armour and practise Roman army tactics like The Turtle to prepare for battle. There have been some explosive (and very messy) moments in our science and geography lessons, such as investigating how volcanoes erupt, testing types of tectonic plates, exploring which materials make the best insulators and understanding how the digestive system works, including the production of poo!

Our English work has covered a wide range of different types of writing, t example newspaper reports about finding a strange creature washed up on a beach, different types of stories, a historical diary and a tour guide about the water cycle. The poems children wrote linked to our river theme impressed us with how well they flowed! Children have been inspired to write by participating in such drama activities as role play, conscience alley, freeze frames and hot-seat questioning in role.

Memorable maths work has been going on a time treasure hunt, analysing angles, making terrific triangle types with art straws - and we cannot forget, the big battles of the bands between the classes. The teachers were blown away at how many achieved Rock Legends we had in Year 4. We created a feast for the eyes with art and DT work about food with sculptures using a range of materials - one looked good enough to eat and another was actually eaten! We even considered the French words for our food.
