
YEAR 3

We have moved forward in time into the Neolithic. We have learnt some new vocabulary to describe the changes that happened during this age: agriculture and domestication. We have had a debate about whether life was easier because of agriculture or not with some very interesting ideas put forward.

In science we continued to look carefully at the skeletons of other animals. We reflected on why skeletons have particular characteristics - why does this bird have such light, thin bones? Why does this goat have such a thick part on the front of their skull? We have also made and annotated animal skeletons.

In English we have started a poetry unit. We have begun by exploring seashore items (there was a lot of sand and we found that the seaweed really smells!) and using our findings to create an alliterative poem.

In Maths we are comparing and ordering 3-digit numbers. We played an intense game of last person standing in which children had a number and challenged each other. The person with the smaller number had to sit down.



YEAR 4

Hello, to all our year 4 families! We have had another busy week in year 4! On Monday we started our subtraction learning in Maths following on from addition focus last week. The children are continuing to work hard on their presentation when working with the column method. We have also be practising times tables, focusing on 7s and 9s this week. In English we have started a new unit of work called Family Album, this is a poetry unit based around Michael Rosen's poetry, we have been looking a speech verbs and practiced writing a short poem with these. In Science this week the children researched Benjamin Franklin, this is our significant scientist this half term, the children created some fantastic visual notes around the scientist. In History the children are continuing to learn about The Romans. This week we looked at Celtic villages and Roman settlements. The children then designed a birds eye view of these on squared paper. In art the children are continuing to design their zine comics using the Manga styles of drawing.

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<u>YEAR 5</u>

Year 5 have had another wonderful week, with the highlight being our visit to the Castle Museum. We met a Viking trader, an archaeologist investigating Anglo Saxon graves and a Viking storyteller who all showed us real and replica historical objects. We also made a brooch, acted out leaving our Scandinavian village to settle in Briton and learnt lots of new facts that extended the history work we have already done in school. The museum were impressed by the behaviour of the children and even commented saying, they were the best group of pupils they have had! Well done Year 5.

In other areas, we have continued working on the written method of column subtraction and started rounding to estimate and check our answers in maths; investigated the effects of water resistance in science, then wrote a report about it and learnt a poem by Christina Rossetti about the moon in English. We have also been comparing poems about the moon by different poets to look for descriptive language techniques and practised our reading skills (inference, retrieval and vocabulary) by continuing to look at Jabberwocky by Lewis Carroll.

In our art lesson, we have continued to investigate typography by starting our final piece of work, designing and making a 3D map.

The Year 5 team are always amazed by the brilliantly inventive and hardworking children we work with, but at the Castle Museum we were so proud when the workshop leaders said that they were one of the most engaged and well-behaved groups they have worked with. What superstars!




YEAR 6

This week, we delved into the poem "The Sea" by James Reeves. Our discussions focused on the use of personification, and it was amazing to see how the children identified this literary device not only in our poem but in others as well. Initially, learning the poem by heart seemed daunting, but through creative visual maps and teamwork, the children memorized it and performed it enthusiastically in front of the class. Their creativity shone brightly, making the experience both fun and memorable!

In Science, we engaged in meaningful conversations about making healthy lifestyle choices. We shared our thoughts on nutrition, exercise, and overall well-being, which sparked a lively discussion. It's wonderful to see the children thinking critically about their health! The highlight of the week was undoubtedly the house assemblies. Our Year 6 candidates delivered their speeches with such passion and inspiration. It was heart-warming to see how they embraced the opportunity to represent their houses and express their pride in our school community. Blake Class

Children in Blake class have been working hard on subtraction this week. We have been using Base 10 to see exchanging and are working with up to 4 digit numbers with more than one exchange. We have then thought about how we could do these calculations on paper using columns. These processes can be tricky but children are using their practical learning to help them think through each step.

In art, children looked at Van Gough's famous Sunflowers and recreated it in their own style. During art lessons, children also learn about the artist and their most famous works. The children have expressed themselves through their creations and we have some lovely work for display. Our grass caterpillars have grown so much! They are on the windowsill with plenty of light, air, water and nutrients from the soil - all things that plants need to grow well. Children have been working on their double page spread to show their learning over this unit.
